Year 11 Drama Spring 1 – Performing and Acting (Scripted and Devising Unit)	
What concepts will we be covering this half term?	Curriculum mapping for students This half term students will be preparing for their practical scripted performances. This is one of the practical units that counts towards the final GCSE grade students receive. Students have been placed in performances groups and have been given the duologue/monologue/script they will be performing – students now have to rehearse their performances and bring the characters to life on stage. Tasks to complete so we can assess your understanding/ Key Performance Indicator	Task 1 – Watch the 'How the performers use their voice' and 'How performers use their body' videos. Once watched, note down all the vocal and physical skills you can use in performance and then state how you plan to alter each one to present the character you play in your performance.

Task 2 – Watch the 'interpreting and performing a character' and 'learning a text' videos – then use what you have learnt as inspiration to bring the character you play to life. If

	you are performing a monologue, use the guidance in the 'how to perform a monologue' video to improve your acting.
	Task 3 – Watch the 'Stanislavski objectives of the character' video to learn about the units and objectives rehearsal technique. Go through all of the lines you say in your scripted performance and assign each line an 'I Want' for the character – then try performing the lines using these 'I wants' – you should notice an improvement in your acting, because you have a deeper understanding of your character.
	Task 4 – Rehearse your lines and perform your script with a family member or friend.  Make sure you know all of your lines perfectly.
What can you do if you need help/ support?	If you need some support with this work, you should contact your drama teacher via their school email address. When you email, you should attach the work you have done so far, explaining any difficulties you are having. They will try to get back to you as quickly as they can.
